Dear friends,

The Friday before writing this "Pastor's Corner," I had the privilege of officiating at the Witness of the Resurrection/Celebration of Life service for David Anthony Caruso. In that service, Nick, Dave and Vella's son, mentioned a piece of David's life philosophy. He said that when someone asked David for something, he most always said, "Yes."

Saying "yes" is an act of faith and an act of stewardship, isn't it? It is an act of faith because we trust we will always have enough. It is an act of stewardship because we recognize that we are given gifts of time, treasure and talent – not to keep for ourselves, but to share with our world. God has said "yes" to us in so many ways, and we are invited to say "yes" back to God. This prayer by Walter Brueggeman in his book of prayers, "Awed to Heaven; Rooted to Earth," expresses this well, I think:

You are the God who is simple, direct, clear with us and for us. You have committed yourself to us. You have said YES to us in creation, YES to us in our birth, YES to us in our baptism, YES to us in our awakening this day.

But we are of another kind, More accustomed to "perhaps, maybe, we'll see," Left in wonderment and ambiguity.

We live our lives not back to your YES, But out of our endless "perhaps."

So we pray for your mercy this day that we may live YES back to you, YES with our time, YES with our money, YES with our sexuality, YES with our strength and with our weakness YES to our neighbor, YES and no longer "perhaps."

In the name of your enfleshed YES to us, even Jesus who is our YES into your future. Amen.

Friends, as individuals and as a church, may we courageously continue to step out in "YES" to God. "Yes" to our community and others. "Yes, yes, yes."

All God's Children are Safe

In light of recent upticks in gun violence and recognizing a need to update some of our general safety protocols, the Session appointed a small group of people – Bob Hartman, Mike Foster, Suzanne Carl, and Pastor Laurie – to come up with some recommendations to continue our legacy of being a welcoming congregation while also keeping our congregants safe.

Here are some of the things that have been done as of mid-May:

- Emergency exit cards are now in the pews. In case of fire or other emergency, the laminated gold cards will help people know how to exit safely.
- 2. All First Aid kits have been updated and additional materials (tourniquets, bleeding bandages) have been added.
- A floor bolt and window shade have been installed in the library and volunteer office space so people can lock themselves in there if necessary.
- Session has approved the locking of entry doors shortly after worship begins. We've created signs at the entrances so that people know they are welcome and where they can enter if they arrive at church late for services.
- A small safety/security team is being formed and trained so that we have a volunteer each Sunday morning tending to the doors and other safety/security needs.
- 6. While we have a number of retired doctors and nurses in the congregation, we also hope to have more people trained in First Aid procedures, in use of the AED, and in a "Stop the Bleed" program.
- You can expect some "Minutes for Safety" in the announcements before worship this summer. The "Minutes" will give the congregation tips on what to do in case of fire, someone falling or getting ill in church, active shooter, etc.

This is an ongoing process. If you have thoughts or concerns or ideas, please speak with Bob, Mike, Suzanne, Pastor Laurie or a Session member.

Here are some tips for choosing a sturdy, effective backpack*:

Choose a backpack with wide, padded shoulder straps.

Narrow straps can dig into shoulders, causing pain and restricting circulation. They are also less sturdy and more likely to rip after just a few weeks or months of use.

Look for padding.

The part of the pack that rests on the child's back should also be well padded. This adds comfort and provides protection from any sharp edges or objects inside the pack.

Select a backpack that is lightweight, but sturdy.

Look for strong zippers and tough nylon fabrics that will resist rips and tears without adding extra weight. Reflective fabric is a good idea, especially if your child is walking, riding his or her bike, or going to and from the bus stop.

Wheels may not be a good idea.

Some schools do not allow backpacks on wheels. Wheels make navigating crowded areas more difficult.

Stewardship

The Finance and Stewardship Council will focus on Finance and the aspects of Stewardship on a monthly basis this year, along with the rewards of donating to the church.

This month I will write about stewardship in my family, as a youth. My mother would say at various times, as we all have heard, that we need to support the church and "God will reward us many times over." I had many siblings (eleven) in my family and volunteering was the way we kids supported the church throughout our childhood years.

A memorable time for me was one summer when my father volunteered to take old bricks off the side of our two-story church and replace the bricks with new aluminum siding. He offered his and our time, with the understanding he could have the removed bricks for salvage. Dad was a contractor, and we would help him on some of the small jobs he would undertake. The hardest part of this job was cleaning the old mortar off the bricks with a hammer and chisel, being careful not to break the bricks. We would transport the cleaned bricks in the back of a pickup truck to a job site, where Dad used the salvageable ones to build a fireplace in a cottage under construction.

I remember my parents contributed to the church in various ways; by donating, repairing items at the church, or providing a meal to a sick member.

I have been a member of FPC for 14 years. It is great to belong to an active church, where the members take stewardship seriously and make FPC a vibrant place to worship, belong, serve, and grow in my faith. Thank you all!
